## Jewish Noshes

Once upon a time there was 100 pounds of flour, 100 pounds of sugar, 60 pounds of potatoes, 58 dozen eggs, 6 gallons of olive oil, 30 pounds of cream cheese, 25 pounds of chocolate chips, 9 chickens, etc., etc., etc., waiting to be turned into 129 challah, 675 knishes, 257 babka, 412 blintzes, 88 quarts of matzo ball soup, 556 boureka, and 1,116 macaroons. And it didn't happen through magic. It took 1500 people hours to do the planning, cooking and shopping that was necessary.

But if you happened to walk into the Synagogue almost any day during the month of November, along with the delicious aromas you smelled, you heard the sounds of the cooks laughing, sharing stories and having a good time even while peeling potatoes or waiting for the dough to rise.

The result was our first "Jewish Noshes," which had evolved from the "Nosh of the Month," which had evolved from the "Jewish Food Festival." And it was a great success by every standard. Our customers who came on December 3 to pick up their purchases were delighted with the organization and how beautifully the room was set up. We even had a tchotchke booth, gift cards and cookbooks for those who wanted to do some additional shopping.

Tentative plans are to do a slightly expanded "Jewish Noshes" in the future. Watch for the date, and if you haven't been involved, consider joining in.

from Rabbi Tom Samuels

**Message From Rabbi Tom, CKA  
Creating a Sacred Congregation**

*“You stand this day, all of you, before the Lord your God: your tribal heads, your elders and your officials, your children, your wives, even the stranger within your camp, from woodchopper to water drawer, to enter into the covenant of the Lord your God.” (Deuteronomy 29: 9-10)*

We are all standing before God. Each and every one of us. Each and every day of our lives. Across the generations, past and future. And in each generation, teaches Rabbi Donnie Hartman, in each expression of the Torah, we must ask ourselves: What do we do with this heritage? This wisdom? This pedagogy for pursuing a life of meaning and of purpose? How will we use it to inform our own lives? The lives of our children? Of their children?

A major theme in American religion over the past three decades has been the rise of meaning-seeking on the part of Americans of all faiths. An evolution beyond the paradigm of a function community based on a passive consumer-client relationship (i.e. Jews in the Pews), to that of an actively involved membership of a sacred community.

As such, we are challenged now more than ever to provide environments where meaning-making can happen. To produce experiences and opportunities that can enrich our lives, expand our connection to this world, and that speak to our very souls.

Perhaps this process starts with asking ourselves that core, fundamental, and consequently most difficult question: Why be Jewish? Why remain Jewish? What is our answer

that can inspire a life-long commitment to the Jewish People and to Judaism itself? That can help to foster a Jewish life that revives our spirit, rekindles our passion for living, and infuses our lives with joy and with meaning? That satisfies our basic human need to, in the words of Rabbi Jay Michaelson, touch the transcendent in this world? To express our humanity?

The ultimate question then, is, how important is a Jewish future to us? How seriously do we want ourselves, and our children to take Judaism? I leave us all with more questions than answers. After all, this is the Jewish Way.

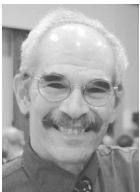
