So, we've finally had real snowfalls. It's about time but, frankly, I'm not quite as enamored of snowfalls as I once was. I used to be a weather geek, knowing all about weather, like, for instance that the term "weather" actually, officially means: Stuff other than the normal blah on the calendar. Thus, a snowfall is "weather", whereas a nice quiet chilly day is not. And that's the end of our weather seminar.

So, instead (Yeah, I know, I've already started 2 paragraphs with "So", but since it's my article, you can't sue me for that.) I think it might be time to talk a little about our Jewish Community. In some ways, our Jewish Community is much like it has been for decades. We have holiday and Holy Day services and kiddushes and dinners and events. We even have occasional life-cycle events like weddings and bar/bat mitzvahs. We have fund-raising events and activities. We have offices that do super-human work keeping track of the rest of us by putting out formal and informal information announcements.

So it sounds like we're just humming along with Jewish Life As Usual (Yeah, so it's 3 in a row. Get over it.). But – and there's always a But – we are not humming along as usual. What we are doing is Shrinking - a lot. And it is really scary. I believe in my brain that, logically, there must still be lots of Jews and Jewish families in our neighborhood. There is no reason to believe that they've all died and/or all moved away. I believe, instead, that many, many of the Jews and Jewish families in our cities, towns, and neighborhoods are simply going about their secular lives without "practicing" their Judaism in the traditional organizational/congregational ways. For whatever reasons, both conscious or not, intentional or not, they are NOT choosing to participate as active parts of the Twin Tiers Jewish Community.

But, I am an optimist. With my strong innate belief in both Jews and Jewish People and, frankly, this neighborhood that has been my emotional home for my whole life. I still strongly believe that our Twin Tiers Jewish Family is not dead and is not dying. A prime example was this year's Chanukah dinner. Many, many families came to eat, to light candles, to schmooze, and just to be Jewish together. I was ecstatic! I hope those who attended were too.

So (for the fourth and last time), come rain or snow or stale Hamantaschen I am optimistically optimistic that our Jewish Community in the Southern Tier will continue for as far as the eye can see, because we're Jews, because we are friends, and because we FEEL like a Jewish Community, in our souls, in our hearts, and in our guts. And it makes me warm all over to say it. Shalom everyone, Marcus

#### from Executive Director Ashley Gillan



Lately, I've been reading a lot about nonprofits. Go figure. And consistently, each think tank /blogger/selfproclaimed expert says to make your organization's goals and mission clear; to let people know what you're doing and how you're accomplishing it.

Well, recently, here at the JCF, we completed one of the most important things we do each year: our 2022 UJA campaign allocations were sent out. A total of \$41,831, was sent to international, national, and local organizations, each supporting great causes and each selected and vetted by the Allocations committee, led by the fearless Judy Prentice.

(I also want to mention Marc Hample, who is the chairman of the UJA campaign and works tirelessly to keep things moving throughout the year. Without him, none of this would be possible.)

So where did all that money go? This year, with the events of Oct. 7,

the main priority shifted to overseas

groups, most of which are on the front lines of the conflict in Israel, working to help those who need it most. For example, for the first time ever, the Allocations committee sent money to three hospitals who have been getting the majority of cases from the fighting: the Hadassah Hospital system; Soroka Medical Center in the South of Israel, which is 25 miles from Gaza and, according to their website has treated more than 1,400 wounded since the beginning of the conflict; and Assuta Ashdod, a northern Israeli hospital treating patients from the conflict, in a building complete with a bomb shelter.

The allocations committee also continued to give money to groups like the Anti-Defamation League and Southern Poverty Law Center, in an effort to combat rising anti-Semitism at home. We've seen it rear its ugly head right here in the Finger Lakes region and fighting for the right to be openly Jewish is more important than ever. Locally, we are continuing to give to food pantries across the Twin Tiers. Food insecurity is one of the region's most pressing needs. WETM reported in September that local agencies like Catholic Charities and the Salvation Army were teaming up with the Food Bank of the Southern Tier to meet the rising demand for food services. All three agencies received money from the UJA campaign.

There are many other organizations that received funds from the UJA campaign, and I would encourage anyone who wants more information to reach out and ask about them. Our commitment to creating a lasting impact with the money raised through the campaign is something we at the JCF and on the Allocations committee take seriously and we want to assure you that that is happening.

#### from Rabbi Tom Samuels



#### Message From Rabbi Tom, CKA Finding God in the Everyday

Rabbi Yaakov Shimshon of Kosov (Ukraine, 1814 - 1880) loved to share with his students the stories of the great Jewish mystics, the Hassidim. It once happened after morning prayers that Rabbi Yaakov began to tell one story after another without stopping. He and his students were lifted to such a state of divine rapture that they stepped out of time. The day passed, and it wasn't until late in the afternoon that the rabbi told his final tale. Soon afterwards, ever so slowly, everyone returned to the reality of the physical world, realizing that they had eaten neither breakfast nor lunch.

One of the students stood up and honored Rabbi Yaakov, saying: "Until this moment, Rabbi, I did not really understand Moshe Rabbeinu, Moses our sacred teacher, when he said that while on Mount Sinai he ate no bread and drank no water. (Exodus 34:28) Now I know what it is like to be filled with the very Presence of God and to feel no further need to eat or drink." Rabbi Yaakov nodded his appreciation to his student and said, "Your interpretation is a worthy one, my son, but perhaps Moses was not celebrating his transcendence of food and drink, but actually regretting it?"

Perhaps Moses realized, Rabbi Yaakov imagined, that in those forty days on Mount Sinai when he neither ate nor drank, he had actually failed to uplift the divine sparks in his own bread and water. In the World to Come, would these sparks complain to the Holy One that Moses did them a grave disservice by putting his own love of God before their liberation? (From Rabbi Rami Shapiro's book, Hassidic Tales)

Rabbi Yaakov was drawing upon a foundational Jewish principle that all the parts of Creation, even food and drink, contain a spark of the Divine, a Nitzotz in Hebrew. A human being's deepest spiritual work is to release those sparks and return them to God by using the things of this world in a righteous and honorable manner.

Imagine that. Even Moses, the only human being to come face to face

with HaShem, the Divine, needed to focus on the ordinary.

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel famously taught that we tend to read the Bible looking for mighty acts from God. Meanwhile, the God of the Bible is actually waiting for us human beings to find life's greatest mysteries in the beautiful simplicities of our every day lives.

Listen carefully to the words of the Prophet Elijah, "There was a great and mighty wind, splitting mountains and shattering rocks by the power of the Lord; but the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind, an earthquake; but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake, fire; but the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire, a kol demamah dakkah, the sound of a delicate silence." (1 Kings 19)

The Divine, Rabbi Heschel was teaching us, as was Rabbi Yaakov in our story above, is found in the ordinariness. The every day. The seemingly most mundane aspects of our lives. That is where God resides. B'Shalom,

#### It's Purim time!


