Joint Fundraiser bringing Purim cheer

Congregation Kol Ami and the Jewish Center and Federation are coming together to organize a new fundraiser for members and their guests to enjoy before heading upstairs for the annual Purim Spiel.

The merriment on March 24 begins in the downstairs at 2 p.m. in Braunstein Social Hall with a tasting of kosher and/or kosher for Passover wine from Lighthouse Liquors and Wines, and beer, from Iron Flamingo Brewery in Corning. The beverages will be accompanied by a selection of cheeses, fruit, chocolate and other goodies to nosh on.

Tickets are \$18 per person for either the wine tasting or the beer tasting. A nonalcoholic "Designated Driver" package, which will include the food and a selection of sodas and other beverages, is \$8 per person.

RSVPs are due to the JCF office by March 8th.

Each alcohol package will come with four tickets for drinks. The wines will include a selection of two whites and two reds, selected for their great taste and variety. Iron Flamingo is a craft brewery, which "uses local farmers for their hops and malt," according to their website. The four tickets are for four of the chosen beverage type.

Each attendee will also receive a commemorate shot glass as part of their paid ticket package.

Liz and I recently took a trip to New Hampshire. I was fortunate enough to be able to spend three days downhill skiing with my daughter Susan and her husband Quinn. After a long hiatus, both Susan and I started skiing again 3 years ago. We are trying to make it an annual event.

Until a certain point in both in our lives, I would zoom down the mountain and wait for Susan patiently midtrail or at the bottom. When we both started skiing again, I discovered that had changed. Now she is ahead and waits patiently for me at the stopping point.

I was trailing her down the slope and passed a father (I assumed) guiding a small child of about three down the slope. This brought back memories of me doing the same for Susan when she was that age. I yelled to the assumed father "Watch out they grow up. I did the same with my daughter 31 years ago and now I can't keep up with her. She's ahead of me as usual." He laughed. Our son Michael, who also started skiing the same way was unable to be with us because of conflicting priorities at home including a 22-month-old son. We all agreed, including grandson Maxwell, that he would start skiing next year. As we talked about this during our weekly family Zoom meeting, I though what a nice tradition to have. My parents started me skiing when I was three back in the days of rope tows and it will continue. My mother, may her memory be a blessing, would periodically remind me I was the cause of any back pain she might have due to how we would have to go up the rope tow together when I was three and unable to do it by myself. Fortunately, rope tows were gone before our children were born.

I started thinking about our congregation, the Jewish community, and the wonderful traditions we have. While skiing is a nice family tradition, it is not particularly critical one in my opinion. In contrast, many of the Jewish traditions we have in total are critical to the future of Judaism. Individual practices may change or ebb and flow

with the times, but certain elements are critical to our continued existence as a community.

As we look to the future, we need to take steps to ensure our future viability. Like the situation of the young skier, we need caring parents who will take the time and energy to make sure their children are educated with basic skills and knowledge and to guide them down the slope until they are able to navigate on their own. We need instructors to provide the training that parents are unable to provide. Many parents understand that children may learn more effectively from the teaching of others in addition to themselves. We need a facility in some form or fashion for this to take place as skiers utilize ski areas or even hills in their own back yards. We utilize our building and people's homes. We need skiers whose numbers and support allow all of this to happen on the ski slope just as we need congregants who support the community with their resources in terms of time, talent, and money.

Increased temperatures and reduced snowfall as our weather patterns continue to change may threaten the existence local ski areas. They have survived thus far through innovations such as snow making and utilizing technology to increase efficiency and safety. More innovation will undoubtedly be required, however.

We survived as a community during the pandemic by using Zoom to bring people together and in the face of a decline in local Jewish population we have a very active and hardworking community. More innovations will undoubtedly be required, however.

I know most people are not skiers just as I know most people, at least in this area, are not part of the Jewish community. Our traditions are important to us though and critical to the continued existence of Judaism. What do we need to be doing now and in the next couple of years to help ensure today's three-year-old will have a Jewish community for their children to partake in the tra-

ditions we have been blessed with over the years?

We are one congregation with a diversity of viewpoints. It is this diversity which makes us stronger but with the responsibility to keep lines of communication open, so all community members feel connected, welcomed, and valued.

We have had conversations on this topic, but the path forward is not crystal clear by any means. We look forward to hearing your thoughts and working with you towards securing a Jewish future for those whom we may never meet. As I mentioned at High Holidays, we welcome any input or feedback regarding what you think as being good, not so good, different, or just plain confusing. If you have questions or concerns, please bring them directly to the Rabbi, a Trustee, an officer, or me. If we don't know about a something that needs to be examined or changed, we can't even begin to do anything about it.

Message From Rabbi Tom, CKA Embracing Our Topsy-Turvy World: Lessons from Purim

(From the teachings of Rabbis Irwin Kula, Ed Feinstein, Shai Held and Harold Schulweiss, and Professors Donnie Hartman, Ethan Dor-Shav, Atar Hadari and Noam Zion)

Throughout Jewish scriptures, situation after situation unfold in which human beings are thrust into the messy reality of everyday life. A thread runs through these myths, our stories: an acceptance of, even an embrace of the inherent vulnerability that is life itself. Everything can change overnight.

And so, our Jewish tradition teaches us to savor the sweetness of life, the magic of the everyday. That every minute counts because eventually it is going to end. "That the fleeting joys of life are real, and at that very moment exists all of the meaning of the world."

How then are we able to learn to navigate life's inevitable ebbs and flows? Is it even possible to thrive in an imperfect, unpredictable and topsy-turvy world?

Let us look at the upcoming holiday of Purim in this context.

The very name of the holiday, *Purim* (meaning lottery in Hebrew), "suggests the absurdity and vulnerability of historical events." The

Book of Esther opens in Shushan, the capital city of Ancient Persia, with a celebration of the peace and prosperity of King Ahashverosh's rule. According to the Talmud, the Jewish population ate, drank and caroused along with the non-Jewish inhabitants of the city.

Onto this complacent scene came a new prime minister called Haman. He was glorified by everyone except Mordecai the Jew, who refused to bow down to him. In a fit of fury, Haman determined to kill not only Mordecai, but his entire people. Haman obtained the king's authorization, cast lots to pick a day for the genocide, and set the wheels of destruction in motion.

One can imagine the Jews' confusion: One minute they were highly integrated, loyal citizens of Persia, and the next they were being hunted down by their gentile neighbors. "And the city of Shushan was bewildered," says the Megillah. Our great sages describe a Jewish ethos which tends to believe in the inherent goodness of human nature. Who would willfully decide to kill an entire people, an innocent people - men, women, and children?

(Almost two millennia later, Alexander Donat explained in his chronicle of the Warsaw ghetto why the Jews did not resort to armed re-

sistance initially: "We could not now believe that the Third Reich was a government of gangsters embarked on a program of genocide 'to solve the Jewish problem in Europe.' We fell victim to our faith in mankind.")

Rabbi Kula teaches that rather than teach absolute truths, Judaism invites us to "dance with dualities and contradictions: Life and Death; Hate and Love; Right and Wrong: Sorrow and Joy. There is no perfect balance: no end to the highs and lows, to the darkness and the light."

We read in the Book of Ecclesiastes (1: 1-5): "Hevel Havalim, says the Preacher. All is Hevel. What does man gain by all the toil at which he toils under the sun? A generation goes, and a generation comes, but the earth remains forever. The sun rises, and the sun goes down, and hastens to the place where it rises..."

All of life is *Hevel Havalim*, fleeting transience, oft mistranslated as 'vanity.' All life is temporary. Like a short breath. With this in mind, let us commit to embracing every moment of our ever so precarious and thus precious lives.

Why I Attend Saturday Morning Services

It all started when I was a girl. My family was secular and after my grandmother died when I was 5, lighting candles on Shabbat ended and so did most Jewish ritual. Holidays were a time to visit family. For Passover, we did change out plates for fancy ones and ate matza and gefilte fish.... But there was never a seder. Despite this secular Jewish lifestyle, my parents sent me to Hebrew school. Where I lived in the Catskills, it was 4 days/week after school... not Sunday school.

I attended services every Saturday morning, sitting upstairs at the back of the sanctuary behind a curtain with the rest of the women who mostly chatted. The synagogue was a couple of blocks away from where I lived so I could easily walk. I never attended Friday night services, (assuming they had them), as I would have to walk alone at night.

I was mesmerized by the Shabbat morning service. Although I had no idea what was being said, (all Hebrew), I Loved listening to it, and I Absolutely Loved the melodies of the prayers! And then... the Torah was taken out of the Ark! I didn't get to get near it, but I knew it was special. Everyone wanted to touch it. Some of my most favorite prayers were those when the Torah was removed from the Ark.... And returned to the Ark.

Of course when after 3 ½ years of Hebrew school, I learned that after completing 5 years, I would receive a certificate of completion, I left... and I left Judaism. I did return as an adult and was a Bat Mitzvah at 49 years old. I lead the entire Saturday morning service!

Fast forward to 2019 when I joined CKA. I naturally was drawn to come to the Shabbat morning service. I knew the Friday night service as I belonged to a Reform synagogue in Philadelphia, and we only had Friday night services... BUT THERE WAS NO TORAH! For me, without the Torah, there is no Judaism. When I am near it, I feel like I am close to something sacred!

I asked Rabbi Oren if I could lead the Torah service. At the time we had our wonderful Miriam with her beautiful voice doing it. I didn't know all of the prayers and he gave me music for what I didn't know. When Miriam wasn't there one Shabbat, he asked me. I was excited and scared. What if I screwed up? I learned quickly that our congregation is very forgiving. At this point, Rabbi Tom offers the Honor of leading the Torah Services most Shabbats, and it is an Honor!

The Torah Service prayers really move me! Then, since I know some Hebrew, I began occasionally pointing. What a thrill to see those letters and be able to follow along!... especially when Sharon reads. She reads so sweetly and slowly enough that I can follow. I have read some, but don't have a lot of confidence. I am currently enrolled in a Biblical Hebrew class. If I know what I am saying, it will be easier to consider reading.

So... that's why I attend Shabbat morning services. Won't you join me some Shabbat?

This year's annual speaker is Maud Dahme. She was born in Amersfoort, Netherlands, to Dutch and French Jewish Parents. In 1942, at the age of 6, the German regime began deportation of Jews, and her parents sent her and her sister to be sheltered with Christian Families in the Resistance, where they sheltered until the Allied Liberation of the Netherlands.

In the 1950's, her family emigrated to the United States, landing in New Jersey, where she now lives. She is an active and passionate advocate for Holocaust Education, and was featured in the documentary "The Hidden Child," which was broadcast on PBS, as well as being shown at the Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C. Because of her work in Holocaust Education, she was also inducted into the New Jersey Hall of Fame in 2014.
