The vast and storied history of Jewish art will be the topic of a two-part adult education workshop, offered by the Jewish Center and Federation of the Twin Tiers.

The Jewish Art Primer Lecture Series, featuring Richard McBee, a prominent art historian and painter based in New York City, will take place on April 7th and 14th from 7 to 9 p.m. on Zoom. The lectures are free and open to anyone who wishes to attend.

His first lecture will cover "Dura Europos, Synagogue Mosaics, Manuscripts: 250 CE - 18th Century." His sec-

ond session is a brand new presentation, being unveiled at this series, titled "The Haggadah - A Passover Primer; 14th Century - 21st Century."

McBee is extremely connected in the Jewish art world. He studied painting at the Art Students League of New York and has written for the Forward, the Jewish Week, Jewish Ideas Daily, and Mosaic magazine. He is a member of the International Association of Art Critics (AICA) and the Association for Jewish Studies, according to his website, RichardMcBee.com.

His paintings, including series on the Biblical women Sarah, Hagar, and the patriarchs Abraham and Isaac, have been exhibited and reviewed in several galleries.

Reunited with her parents, who were hidden underground by Danish gentiles, her family emigrated to the United States in the 1950's settling in New Jersey where she now lives. She was featured in the documentary "The Hidden Child," which was broadcast on PBS as well as being shown at the Holocaust Museum in Wash-

Once again, I received inspiration from the Shopkeeper's Shabbat service this week. The company was great, the food was excellent thanks to the talents of Gil, Harriet, Stuart and Vickie, and a meaningful yet brief service with discussion led by Rabbi Tom. I distinguish here between real inspiration which prompts me to do something vs. feel good inspiration which leaves me in a better place from when the service began but eventually fades. There are probably more technical terms for this, but I am not schooled on such matters beyond freshman year Psychology 101. I almost always get feel good inspiration from services, but true inspiration is a much rarer experience, but it does happen. How about you? That inspiration is now this article being written a day later.

This weeks' Torah portion talks about the building of the Tabernacle with G-d commanding through Moses that people bring gifts of various materials and talents to build the sanctuary. In fact, people are so generous that eventually there is more than enough materials and they are told to stop bringing things. The artisans and workers then begin their tasks with very specific instructions and objectives.

How does this relate to today? We already have a beautiful sanctuary that was built approximately 70 years ago the same basic process would have had to have taken place as is outlined in the Torah.

Today, we are fortunately concerned with maintenance as opposed to construction. I would argue the idea is essentially the same as is described in this week's Torah portion. Now we need to preserve our sanctuary instead of constructing it, and, perhaps more importantly, preserve what takes place in that sacred space. We are blessed with a great facility that the House Committee maintains with diligence and expertise, so the outlay is relatively low. However, we also have expenses which need to be covered by gifts, also known as dues, pledges, donations (whatever contributions, term you prefer). We have many people giving so freely of their time and talent to provide they great experiences we all enjoy so much. We are truly a fortunate community because people are so generous and committed.

I should also say that, unlike the Torah portion, we are not able to say "stop, we have enough!" Perhaps in our dreams. Therein lies the dilemma. Rabbi Tom mentioned that it was the entire process of building the Tabernacle that brought the community together in ancient times, not necessarily the building itself.

It is our ongoing work today with planning and holding services, events and fundraisers that help bring and keep us together. It is our common mission that bonds us. Make no mistake, the gifts are still needed and then some as we experience operating deficits to maintain what we do. I hope and pray that, as in the Tanach translation I am reading from, "everyone whose heart so moves him [them] shall bring them [gifts]" until the day they are no longer needed.

Nothing has changed since those words were written so many years ago and they remain completely relevant today. Thank you for what you all do.

Passover: Engraving Freedom in our Hearts

Passover is just around the corner. The First Night's Seder falls on Monday evening, April 22. CKA will have our annual Second Night Seder the evening of Tuesday, April 23. I hope that you can join the entire community in sacred celebration of freedom.

In our Torah, we read about the tenth plague that God inflicted on the Egyptians, the killing of their firstborn. Immediately before the plague commenced, God paused the drama and relayed to Moses and to Aaron what seemed to be at best irrelevant information to the narrative:

Exodus 12:2

"This month will be for you the beginning of the months. It will be the first of the months of the year for you."

The great Medieval commentator Rashi (Rabbi Shlomo Yitzchaki, France, 1040-1105) questions the placement of God's declaration at this particular point in the Torah: Shouldn't this declaration of the beginning of time be located at the beginning of the Torah rather than so deep in the weeds of the Exodus drama, asks Rashi?

Rashi

"The Torah should have started with, 'This month will be for you...', for this is the first commandment that was given to Israel."

Rabbi Ovadia ben Jacob Sforno (Italy, 1475-1549) asks this very same question, and reveals a profoundly relevant insight into the placement of God's declaration about beginnings:

Rabbi Ovadia ben Jacob Sforno

"This month will be for you the beginning of the months..." From here on out the months will be yours, for you to do with them as you wish. In the days of slavery, your days were not your own. You had to work for others and do their will. That is why this will be the first of the months of the year for you: because in it you began your liberated existence."

Perhaps, Rabbi David Kasher explains, Sfrono is telling us that that very same moment, right before the actual leaving the slavery of Egypt for the freedom of the desert, is indeed а new beginning for the Israelites, as a free People. "When you are a slave," writes Rabbi Kasher, "in a sense, you do not exist in time, for your time belongs to someone else. Time, for the Children of Israel, really starts with the Exodus."

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, May His Sacred Memory be for a Blessing, points out that although in Rabbinic literature the holiday of Passover is referred to as Zman Cheruteinu, the Time of our Freedom, the word Cheruteinu does not appear anywhere in all of Hebrew scripture. The closest definition of this word that we have is from its root, Charut, which means 'to engrave," which, on its surface has nothing to do with freedom.

Why then did the rabbis deem it necessary to invent a new word for freedom when the Bible already has the word Chofshi? And, what does engraving have to do with freedom?

Rabbi Sacks explains that when freedom is engraved in our hearts, in our very selves, as our defining ethos, as a Charut, that is the freedom that is eternal, sustainable, indelible. "That" Rabbi Sacks concludes "is the kind of freedom to which we are called as Jews and which we recall ourselves every Passover."

Let us use that freedom first to say I'm proud and tall as Jews, and second to work for the freedom and justice of all."
